Alaska's unique environment requires that the designer understands how extreme environmental conditions might have an impact on the project goals and vision. Alaska's landscape architects are trained to consider low sun angles, wind-driven snow and rain, melting permafrost, fire danger, and various other conditions unique to our environment in the design for every project.

Alaska landscape architects are fortunate in that they have a beautiful state to practice in. One famous example of landscape architecture work that was carefully and strategically crafted to highlight fantastic panoramic views is the work completed in 1938 by National Park Service landscape architects: the Denali Park Road.
